Sick and Homebound: We are blessed to have a group of volunteers in our parish who are happy to bring Holy Communion to the sick, the hospitalized and the homebound. Please call the parish office to make arrangements if you or your loved one would like a priest to visit with the Sacrament of Anointing.

#### What's in the Water?

Most of us were probably a bit unsettled when churches started removing holy water at the beginning of the pandemic. Its absence upset our regular routine as we entered the church and searched for that blessed water to dip our fingers and make the Sign of the Cross. For most of us, we do it without thinking...it's a habit as automatic as putting mustard on a hot dog. This simple gesture, however, has deep significance, symbolism and power. So, the question is: **What's in the water?** 

The sacraments of the Church use symbols to signify the grace that they confer. Water has many properties. It is clear, transparent, cleans and refreshes us. It also sustains life, but it can also cause death. In Baptism, these properties of water signify the cleansing of the soul of all sin. As we enter into Baptism, we also die to our old sinful way of life and emerge from the water as a new person. It refreshes our soul and we experience a spiritual rebirth, living a new life as a child of God.

In its true sense, holy water is a 'sacramental'. The Catechism tells us that sacramentals are sacred signs which bear a resemblance to the sacraments. They prepare us to receive grace and help us to sanctify moments in our lives. Their purpose is to make us think of God and His goodness and therefore move us to increase our devotion and love of God. To make holy water, the Church provides for a blessing of water, by a priest or deacon, to be used by the faithful to help them live out their Christian lives. When we enter the church, the holy water is there to remind us that we began our spiritual lives through the regenerating and cleansing waters of Baptism. But there are many other uses for it.

To receive the spiritual benefits from a sacramental, one needs to be in a state of grace and have firm faith in and submission to Christ and His Holy Church. Even with this, one shouldn't expect to automatically receive all the effects of the sacramental, but, graces will be given to those with the proper disposition. We must remember that sacramentals can help us only through the Church's blessing and the uplifting of our hearts to embrace goodness and love of God. They have no power by themselves and we can mistakenly abuse them by viewing them superstitiously.

Every Catholic home should have a holy water font. Teach your children to bless themselves with it, especially before going to bed and when they wake up in the morning. You should also use it when someone is sick or is experiencing some form of affliction. The Church and the saints tell us that holy water should be used as protection against the devil and his evil spirits, storms and other threatening forces of nature, illness, and infectious diseases. When used devoutly along with an act of contrition, our venial sins are pardoned and through its use we receive assistance from the Holy Spirit. Knowing this, I'm pretty sure you would agree with me saying, "Wow...that's some powerful water!"
